The need for more and better skills

Skill shortages and gaps in Europe – Skills gap, limited training opportunities, and unequal access hinder workforce development.

Transformation speed gap – Education and training systems, along with their providers, face challenges in keeping up with rapid technological advancements and evolving skill requirements.

Fragmented governance and skills intelligence – Lack of coordination among stakeholders.

The necessity to develop and enhance skills in education

School and Vocational Education and Training (VET)– Decline in basic skills, digital skills gap among youth, importance of VET to ensure generational renewal in the workforce.

Higher Education– Need for more highly skilled graduates, importance of pooling resources and innovation.

Adult Learning and Lifelong Learning – Low participation in adult education, underrepresentation of women in STEM.

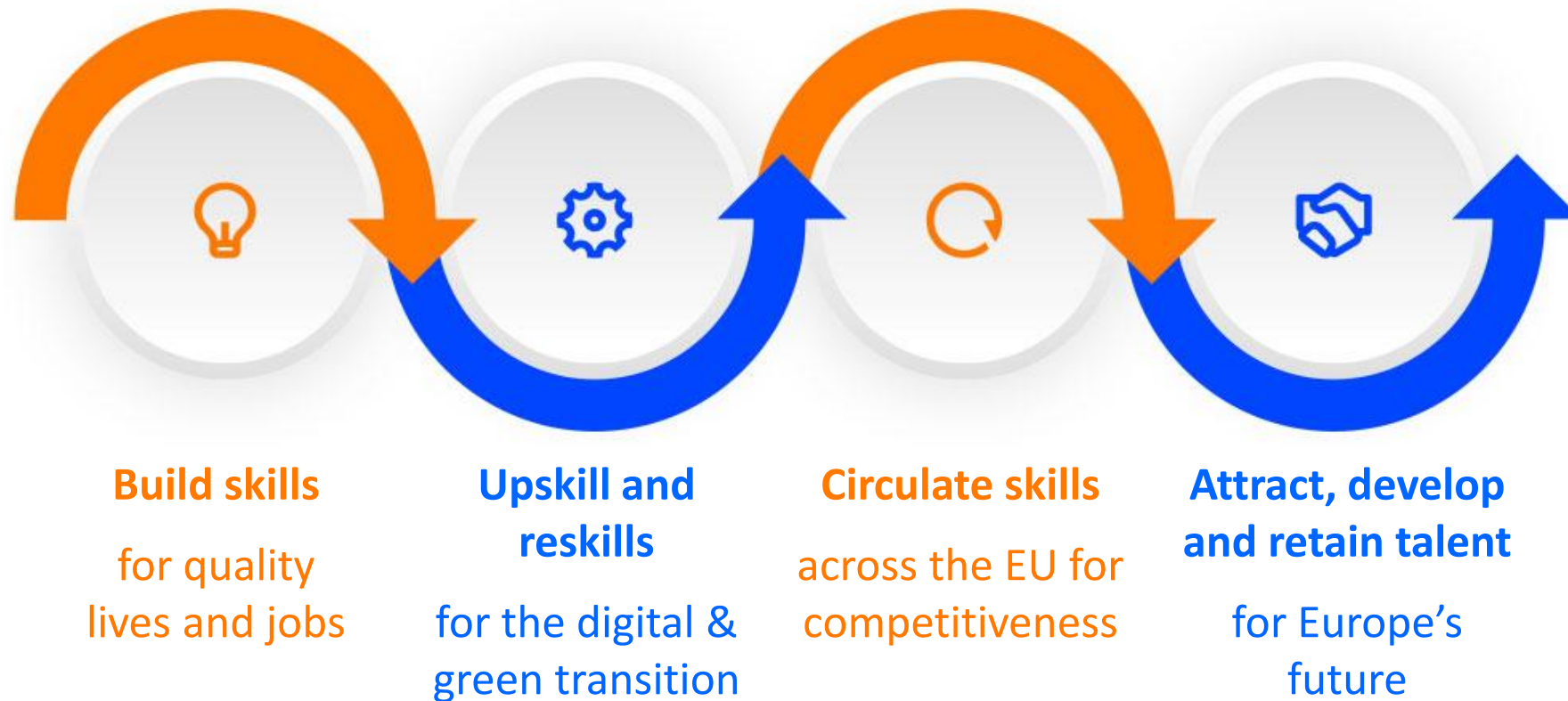

Governance

Towards a dedicated EU 27 Recommendation on human capital: education and skills in the European Semester

A European Skills Intelligence Observatory: providing the necessary data for well-informed policy

It will provide strategic data and foresight regarding skills needs in concrete sectors and regions, and the performance of education and training systems.

A European Skills High Level Board: driving the change

Bringing together key stakeholders to provide comprehensive, cross-sectoral insights and guidance on skills to EU policy makers.

Strengthened Skills Governance

The Commission will enhance collaboration across European Semester elements and Council formations to foster a whole-of-government approach, with a 2025 evaluation of the European Education Area contributing to streamlined skills governance.



Next steps- international dimension

- **STEM Education Strategic Plan:** implementation of actions from 2025 onwards, including new and ambitious targets to raise female participation
- **Marie Skłodowska-Curie Action ‘MSCA Choose Europe’** initiative to make Europe attractive for the best researchers around the world
- **Pilot virtual study fairs and physical promotion activities under the banner “Study in Europe”** to attract students from leading institutions in third countries to study in Europe.
- **New Visa Strategy** with measures to support the arrival of top students, researchers and trained workers from third countries.
- **New target for (international) students:** the annual number of learners from outside the EU coming to study and obtain a degree at tertiary level in the EU should be at least 350 000.
